

O1 FLOOD UPDATE

As a resilient community, the City positioned itself at the ready for potential spring flooding beginning in February with seasonal flood preparedness and a close eye on the National Weather Service Spring Flood Outlooks. And ready we were, as the flood forecast changed from minor inconvenience in February to a possible new historic crest at plus or minus a foot from 22 FT in April.

As the City headed into March, it became clear flood risk could be significant, calling for property owners to prepare for flooding as the City prepared. To assist, community meetings were held in March to help connect property owners with resources to reduce flood risk well before the river rose.

Forecast to reach flood Action Stage of 13 FT in days ahead, the City activated its flood plan on April 6 in response to arriving river stages. The response went like clockwork from there, with the river reaching Moderate Stage on April 21, Minor Flood Stage on April 22, Major Flood Stage on April 25, and cresting at 21.51 on May 1. In total, the river remained above the flood Action Stage of 13 FT for 43 consecutive days and Major Flood Stage of 18 FT for 17 days.

While response went smoothly, some damages were incurred due to river flow and currents that will take time for repair—markedly the pavement, sanitary, and storm sewer failure at Brady and River Dr and Credit Island Lane. Planning and work to perform repairs will continue into June. Noting some damage, Parks and Recreation was pleased to report the resilience of riverfront turf and Credit Island Lodge to flood waters.

On behalf of the DDP Board and downtown stakeholders, **THANK YOU** to City staff and elected officials for the brilliantly managed flood response this spring. There has been overwhelmingly positive commentary from downtown businesses on both the quality of the barrier construction and the daily operations of the Public Works staff making sure the entire floodplain system runs smoothly.

Also, we now have proof the major sewer/stormwater interceptor improvements done along the riverfront during COVID made a measurable impact. Businesses such as Front Street and StompBox on the front lines never experienced sewer backup as in years past, allowing them to remain open even at 21.5 feet of water. It gives me even greater optimism the planned underground improvements at 4th & River Drive and Marquette Street to the west will make the big impact the Flood Mitigation Plan intended.

Thank you for your commitment to keep chipping away at our 9-mile mitigation plan; I realize there's still a lot to do. That said, it's clear we've already made huge improvements since 2019 and more is on the way. Keep up the good work!

02 2023 IOWA LEGISLATIVE SESSION

And that's a wrap on the 2023 lowa Legislative session! This session included advocacy around a number of issues identified by the City Council as priority areas including property tax reform, automated traffic cameras, tax increment financing, building codes, and funding for a new High-Risk Unit for the 7th Judicial District. City staff worked with our local delegation to help mitigate the impacts of property tax reform, providing timely analysis of different draft proposals throughout the session. Staff also worked with our local delegation and law enforcement to include funding in the State budget for a High-Risk Unit for the 7th Judicial District. This unit will partner with our local law enforcement agencies to increase public safety in our community. As the session came to a close, no legislation was passed for automated traffic cameras, tax increment financing, or building codes.

With the 2023 legislative session now complete, City staff will continue to work with local delegation throughout the summer on a number of priority issues including property tax reform impacts and public safety initiatives.

03 DAVENPORT LEADS THE WAY

Staff members from the City of Davenport were requested by the City of Des Moines and the City of Cedar Rapids to present on best practices that Davenport has implemented.

At the request of the US Attorney for the Southern District of Iowa, City staff recently met with the USAO, Des Moines Police Department and the Polk County Attorney's Office to discuss Davenport's implementation of the Group Violence Intervention strategy. City staff shared both the successes and lessons learned in the first year of the GVI strategy, including a nearly 42% decrease in shots fired in 2023 to date as compared to the same time-frame in 2022.

The City of Cedar Rapids Code Enforcement asked to meet with the Development and Neighborhood Services team regarding the American Association of Code Enforcement (AACE) accreditation which the City of Davenport received last year. Davenport became the first agency in the state of Iowa and the seventh in the country to earn agency accreditation through the AACE. The teams also had a chance to exchange ideas and discuss issues that both municipalities have in common.







04 WASTEWATER FEES

Staff recently evaluated the services and cost of services for waste hauler discharges at the Water Pollution Control Plant. The charges had not been reviewed or increased in over a decade. Based on the analysis, a proposal for a rate change was submitted to City Council and approved on March 15, 2023. While the rate will not go into effect until July 1, 2024, the City mailed all haulers information on the changes to better prepare customers for the new fee structure and permit requirements. Here are a few highlights of what the changes will mean:

- In the past, haulers were billed a \$750 Burden & Overhead charge that was distributed amongst haulers based on the percentage of total loads accepted at WPCP. The charge is eliminated under the new fee structure.
- The new process clarifies the billing process and makes bills more predictable based on the type and volume of waste discharged at the facility.

O5 STREAMBANK MAILER

While the City owns much of the property along Duck Creek, most of the other streams, including Blackhawk, Candlelight, Cardinal, Deere, Goose, Hanlin's, Pheasant, Robin, and Silver Creeks, and their unnamed tributaries primarily run through private property. To help protect our waterways and private property owners along these creeks, the City distributed an informational mailing to nearly 2,100 property owners to educate owners on ways to keep their property safe from erosion and improve the quality of the City's water assets. Focused on buffers, erosion, and dumping, staff is hopeful the step will raise awareness about the issues our waterways face and engage property owners in the conversation about ways to conserve private property and the City's water assets.



06 CITIBUS SPOT APP

CitiBus Transit has a new bus tracking app — SPOT. SPOT rolled out to riders in early May and features real-time bus tracking, personal alert capabilities, and easy-to-use trip planning tools. In coordination with the change, several updates to the CitiBus website were also made to streamline information.





07 NEW OFFICER SWEARING IN

Brandon Connell, Ethan Bock, and Jamie Bennett were sworn in as Davenport Police Officers by Mayor Matson after completing a 16-week basic law enforcement training at the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy (ILEA). These officers completed their post academy training and began the 17-week Field Training Officer Program where they will learn the skills to serve and protect our community through hands-on experiences and interactions with citizens.







08 CHANGES TO LANDLORD TRAINING PROGRAM

The Development & Neighborhood Services and Police Department worked together to improve the efficiency of and access to the Landlord Education Assistance Program (LEAP) this month. Key changes include:

- Elimination of the \$25 class fee.
- Training at your own pace and 24/7/365 access to landlord resources at www.davenportiowa.com/leap.
- Moving conducting background checks from the Police Department to the Landlord due to free, open to the public, and easy-to-use tools.

The program, designed to help tenants, property owners, and managers keep drugs and illegal activities out of rental properties, will continue to promote a safe, stable, and welcoming environment for all community members, just in a different way that better fits an ever-evolving world.

O9 NATIONAL PSP SOCIAL NETWORK ANALYSIS WORKSHOP

Davenport Police Crime Analyst Alissa Hawk, Gun Crime Data Analyst Bella Zak, and Lieutenant Jason Smith of the Davenport Police Crime Analysis Unit attended the National Public Safety Partnership's Social Network Analysis Peer Learning Workshop in Cleveland, Ohio. This workshop featured analytical tools aimed at providing law enforcement with a comprehensive overview of their atrisk populations while providing opportunities for strategic interventions and actionable intelligence to support crime prevention strategies. Analysts learned to use Social Network Analysis to leverage existing data to better understand group dynamics and social connections of people impacted by, or involved in, violent crime.



10 VANDER VEER FOUNTAIN RETURNS IN TIME FOR SUMMER

Last year, the Vander Veer Stone Fountain was unable to run during the summer season due to multiple plumbing and water retention issues. Staff worked throughout the summer, fall, and into the winter months with contractors to identify leaks, blockages, and cracks within the underground plumbing system. In late April, water meters were reinstalled in parks and water was turned back on. Once this was complete at the fountain, staff once again began the rigorous testing process to identify and repair the last areas of concern. The fountain is now successfully maintaining water pressure, and retaining and recirculating water for the enjoyment of park visitors.



11 DAVENPORTU GRADUATION

The 7th cohort of DavenportU Citizens Academy completed the 9-week program put on by City staff in May, concluding with graduation at the May 24 City Council meeting.

Project Highlights:

Creating Places | MLK Park

On Monday, May 15, City staff joined Friends of MLK, Estes Construction, and Streamline Architects alongside other community partners for the official ribbon cutting of MLK Park. Using American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, the City of Davenport pledged a \$500,000 grant, and signed a long-term lease for the land, with Friends of MILK for the Plaza.

In January 2014, a task force, gathered by former Davenport Mayor Gluba, developed a plan to create the first formal Memorial Day of Dr. King in the City of Davenport. Nine years later, this vision is now becoming a reality.

The design renderings for the MLK Park show a true community space for gathering, learning, remembrance, and celebration.

O4 MAY FEJERVARY FAMILY FUN DAYS PROMOTING KIDS TO PARKS


